PARTNERS SUPPORT A SINGLE NATIONAL HEALTH STRATEGY

Alignment of support with the Health Sector Strategy



- All DPs confirmed that their support is aligned
- CSOs stated that they participate in sub-sector strategies but not significantly in national health sector planning.

Joint assessment of health sector plan



All DPs participated in joint assessment



Monitoring and Evaluation



- WHO, UNICEF, the Global Fund and the EU Delegation only use national health sector indicators to monitor their support
- The M&E framework for the new national health strategy in place

Mutual accountability processes



 WHO, UNICEF, Canada and the EU Delegation participated in mutual accountability processes






HEALTH DEVELOPMENT COOPERATION IS MORE PREDICTABLE (1)

% of funds disbursed by DP according to agreed schedule






HEALTH DEVELOPMENT COOPERATION IS MORE PREDICTABLE (2)

71% of participating DPs have communicated their planned resources for the next 3 years to the MOPH

HEALTH AID IS ON BUDGET


% of DP aid reported on budget



Many DPs contribute to pooled funds such as ARTF via the Ministry of Finance.

The expenditures from these funds are on budget, but they are not disaggregated by individual DP.






PUBLIC FINANCIAL MANAGEMENT (PFM) SYSTEMS ARE STRENGTHENED AND USED

Strength and use of the PFM system

The World Bank CPIA score has rated the PFM system in Afghanistan as **3.5** over the past 3 years, which indicates a relatively robust system

Capacity building



43% of participating DPs confirm that sufficient support for PFM systems strengthening and capacity building is in place.



PROCUREMENT AND SUPPLY SYSTEMS ARE STRENGTHENED AND USED

Existence and use of national procurement and supply systems



A national procurement and supply strategy exists



29 % of DPs use national procurement and supply systems



43 % of DPs confirm that sufficient support is available to strengthen the capacity of the national PSM system

TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE IS COORDINATED AND SOUTH-SOUTH COOPERATION SUPPORTS LEARNING

Technical assistance is coordinated



There is no national plan for technical assistance in health



DPs don't provide TA in line with a national plan but most asked for better coordination and planning of TA

South-south cooperation



The MOPH benefits from south-south cooperation



Most DPs (except USAID and Gavi) stated that they funded some initiatives that included south-south cooperation

CSO ENGAGEMENT IN HEALTH POLICY DIALOGUE IS SUPPORTED BY GOVERNMENT

MOPH Responses



The Government consults CSOs in the design, implementation and monitoring of national policies



The Government does not provide financial resources to CSOs



The Government provides training support to CSOs

CSO Responses



67% of CSOs confirm that they are consulted



0% of CSOs received financial support from Government



11% of CSOs received training support



CSO ENGAGEMENT IN HEALTH POLICY DIALOGUE IS SUPPORTED BY DPS

DP Responses



70% of DPs consult CSOs when they develop their cooperation programme



86% of DPs provide financial resources to CSOs



57% of DPs provide technical assistance to CSOs

CSO Responses



56% of CSOs confirm that they are consulted



11% of CSOs received financial support from DPs



22% of CSOs received technical assistance from DPs



PRIVATE SECTOR ENGAGEMENT



The private sector is free to select its mandate and its areas of operation.



Private sector institutions and professional associations are not strongly involved in the national policy dialogue.



Minimum required standards for private sector service delivery are currently implemented to regulate healthcare in the private sector.



DP mostly support associations involved in activities aligned with their priorities.



Involvement of the private sector in policy reform efforts can contribute to effective policies.
