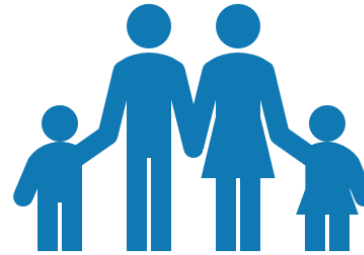

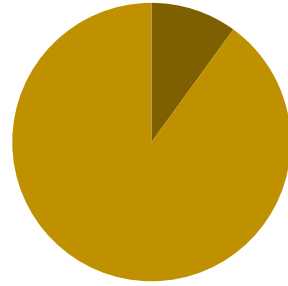

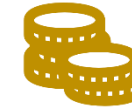

Problems



High and ever-increasing prices of healthcare and premiums

- Collusion between private health insurers companies and private health providers (e.g.: hospitals) leading to a lack of competition in the healthcare market.
